The Evolving Role of Medicare in Clinical Research

The issuance of National Coverage Determination (NCD) in 2000

escalated the number of Medicare beneficiaries participating in clinical trials and introduced significant regulatory compliance challenges into the clinical research industry. Following nearly a year of public discussion, in July 2007 the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services issued revisions to the NCD, entitled the Clinical Trial Policy (CTP). Within days, CMS released a Request for Comments proposing several additional changes to the newly issued CTP. Panelists will discuss the scope of these new and proposed policies and their impact on researchers, beneficiaries, providers and the drug and device industry.

Physician Payment Reform: The Next Generation

For the first time since the advent of the Medicare resource-based

relative value scale compensation methodologies, physician compensation is in the reform spotlight. Even the Institute of Medicine has called for changes to historical methodologies such as those based on fee-for-service and capitation payments. The goal is to align financial incentives with clinical excellence through the use of quality and performance metrics. This session will provide an overview of the evolution of pay-for-performance (P4P) compensation programs both from a conceptual and a practical perspective, explore the views of both advocates of, and opponents to, the P4P approach with an emphasis on the mindset of the physician community, and review the feasibility of P4P programs under the current legal and regulatory environment, and provide insights for successful design and implementation of a P4P program.

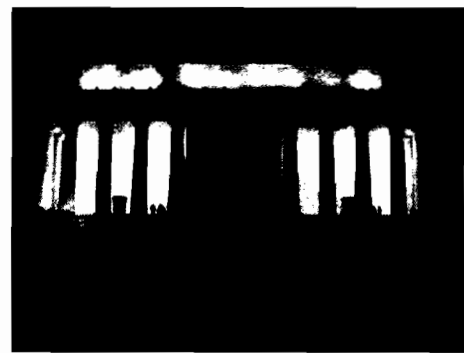

Community Benefit and the Proposed Redesigned Form 990—The Impact on Tax-Exempt Hospitals

The level of community benefit (including charity care) provided by tax-exempt hospitals continues to be in the spotlight, with a focus on what should be included, how it should be reported, and how much is sufficient to justify exemption from federal income tax. This scrutiny is reflected in the recently released draft redesigned Form 990, which would impose new community benefit reporting disclosures, as well as a number of other new reporting requirements that impact tax-exempt healthcare organizations. This session will provide an overview of the draft redesigned Form 990 with a particular focus on the new disclosures affecting hospitals. Insight will also be provided on the mechanics of completing the community benefit report associated with the new form, and how hospitals can be proactive to address these new requirements once the redesigned Form 990 is finalized and ready for use.
