Dear Director Fenniman:

I am writing to invite you to a policy forum on August 17 in Portland, Maine among the leaders of state juvenile justice systems from the ten northeastern states and the legislative chairpersons of the committees that oversee these agencies.

This meeting will be held in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of the Council of State Governments' Eastern Regional Conference, which is typically attended by several hundred elected and appointed state officials from across the region.

This half-day session will be highly interactive. Legislative leaders and leaders in the juvenile justice system will share strategies they have employed to address the following issues, which have presented major challenges to policymakers everywhere:

1. What can policymakers do to reducing bullying in schools? How do state officials enforce sexual misconduct laws and other statutes designed to protect kids when the person who committed the crime is a youth using 21st century technology (e.g., texting, Facebook)?
2. How do you measure programs and policies, and hold agency administrators accountable for improved outcomes, when successful implementation depends on the integration of multiple, independent systems (e.g., child welfare systems, education) and distinct funding streams?
3. How do legislators, who must reduce spending on programs dealing with youth who have committed a crime (or are at risk of committing a crime), target these cuts wisely?
4. What have we learned about responding effectively to substance abuse and mental health needs of kids involved in the justice system? How has the increase in the abuse of prescription drugs and other medications affected this learning?
